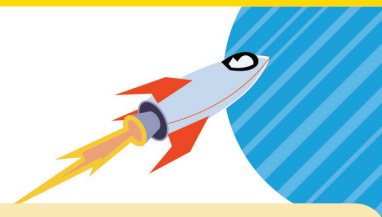


Use this guide to help your family learn how God can give us confidence.

## Activity

### I've Got Questions

#### What You Need:

#### What You Do:

Explain to your child that you will be reading them a question, and they have 30 seconds to answer the question. Say, "Even if you aren't sure you are correct, give me a believable answer!" (More than likely, they won't know the actual answer, so they will need to make up a believable answer that they can try to convince you is correct.)

Ask each question and hear out their answer. If they are incorrect, tell them the right answer!

- Why does the skin on your fingers get wrinkly when you've been in the water for a long time? (*Signals from the brain cause tiny blood vessels underneath the skin to constrict, which causes the upper layer of skin to wrinkle.*)
- Why do we hiccup? (*They are caused by involuntary contractions of the diaphragm, which is a muscle that separates your chest from your abdomen. This muscle plays a major role in breathing, so when it contracts, it causes your vocal cords to briefly close, making the sound of a hiccup.*)
- Why do seashells sound like the ocean? (*The shape of a seashell allows them to capture and reflect ambient noise, which amplifies certain frequencies. In other words, it's really just an echo of quieter sounds around you that you're hearing.*)
- Why are school buses yellow? (*In 1939, transportation officials from all states agreed on a number of safety standards for school buses. They chose yellow because it is a highly visible color, regardless of the time of day.*)

## Talk About the Bible Story

What questions did the man in our story today have? (*He had questions about the scripture he was reading; he had questions about Jesus.*)

What new did Philip share with him? (*The Good News of Jesus*)

Who do you talk to when you have questions?

Is it okay to question things we have always been taught?

What questions do you have? (*Adults: don't be intimidated by this question. Be aware of the potential open door for tricky discussion and be mindful of questions that should be answered with a temporary response of, "Let's figure out a time to discuss that individually." Also, remember this: you are not expected to have ALL the answers! Some things you might not know, and some questions actually don't have definitive answers. It's okay to tell your kid exactly that.*)

## Prayer

Use this prayer as a guide, either after talking about the Bible story or sometime before bed tonight:

"Thank You that You are always with us. Thank You for the gift of Your Holy Spirit. Thank You that You don't mind if we have questions about You. You want us to ask our questions so that we can better understand You. Help us to give answers to others who have questions about You. We love you. Amen!"
